The President, K5KT, Pontificates


President and Close Personal Friend

OK, enough of this...



April: Curtis Kaplan, of NOAA, on The Skywarn program and Weather Spotters.


After that, I expect to get back to some other recommended people, probably including some who will demonstrate new equipment. I haven't actually forgotten the suggestions I have received, and still welcome more.

Now, just to keep this column interesting, here are two slightly radio-related items: I just got a new catalog from American Science & Surplus (www.sciplus.com).

Innumerable things you can easily get along without, though a friend has had great pleasure from the Screaming Flying Monkey. A bit of humor scattered through the listings. The radio connection? Well, there is a 50-yard spool of adhesive 2-inch wide 4-mil aluminum ribbon, \$7.50. That should be a challenge to antenna designers! Jim Murray, W6WXA SK

It is with great regret that we report the passing of long-time ham and PVARC member Jim Murray, W6WXA, at age 85. Jim had a heart attack less than two years ago, and last Wednesday February 13, with his family by his bedside, his heart just finally gave out.

Jim had been a ham since 1946 and was well known for his home-brew receivers and transmitters, which he designed and built from the ground up. He was also an avid model plane builder. Before he stopped driving, you could often find him at the TRW Swap meet searching for parts for his hobbies and the rest of his time in his shop putting his finds to good use. In the later years, his son, PVARC webmaster Rick, K6WXA, would drive him.

Jim had a long career at Hughes Aircraft as manager of the front-end lab, a group charged with creating special test equipment for the company's other projects. The test equipment his group designed and built helpeBird and blue Bird communications satellites, and the old GAR 9 Guided Rockets.

Under Jim's direction, the front-end lab group of about 25 people worked and played together. A social group of lab group members was formed and they went camping about once a month and used surplus police, ambulance, and commercial radios which they modified for the ham bands, to talk between their cars. They called their group the Phugahwees for reasons unknown.


Jim was also a willing participant or maybe even a perpetrator of some pretty good practical jokes. Being a laid-back, easygoing guy, he took it in stride when someone in his group epoxied his coffee cup to the bench every few months. And he was pretty easy going about the weather balloon someone put in his new office and filled with water, although he had to spend that day getting the water out of the balloon before they could haul it away and he could get into his office again. When they alligator-clipped a wire in his car engine to make the horn blow every time he put on the brake, and then lined the sidewalk to watch, he took it in stride.

But Jim Murray gave as good as he got, for instance when he put the security guard's desk and chair in the ladies' bathroom while the guard was on break.

The Phugahwees were all Hams and Jim's son, Rick, learned everyone's call by listening to them on the camping trips when he was a teenager, which is how he recognized WA6ESC when Jim and Rick went to their first PVARC meeting about 4 years ago. Bill Harper is an ex- Phugahwee, having worked for Jim for about 16 years in the 60s and 70s.



Palos Verdes Marathon!

The Palos Verdes Marathon is scheduled for Saturday, 17 May. The Club has provided communications support to the Marathon for many years, and is up again for 2008.

So far, somewhat over half of last year's operators have said they will be back this year, and it's still early, but there will be room for more. If you haven't worked the Marathon before, consider it this year.



The biggest advantage of operating is, of course, that you have an excuse for not running. Aside from that, though, this is a good place to get some practical experience on net operation while being helpful, close to home, and out a nice Spring day. You also get a Marathon T-shirt! Remember your PVARC badges!

The Marathon starts at Point Fermin Park and goes up into Palos Verdes Estates, then does a U turn and returns to Point Fermin. We plan to have operators with the race director, at Point Fermin, at the various aid stations along the route, and at the U-turn. There will be two or three rovers in vehicles moving along the course.

For most of the aid stations, a hand-held transceiver operating in the 440 Mhz band works fine. The PVE end of the course has been difficult, and two or three positions there need mobile units with better than average antennas, and a good eye (ear?) for location. Rick Murray will be back to handle a particularly challenging aid station location at the corner of 25th Street and Western Avenue. He had excellent results last year with a Yagi bouncing his signal off Catalina.

CYCLE 24 HERE, EXPERTS SAY

With the appearance of Sunspot 981 -- a high-latitude, reversed polarity sunspot -- on Friday, January 4, experts at NASA and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) said that Cycle 24 is now here. "This sunspot is like the first robin of spring," said solar physicist Douglas Biesecker of the Space Weather Prediction Center (SWPC), part of NOAA. "In this case, it's an early omen of solar storms that will gradually increase over the next few years." *Ref.: The ARRL Letter, Vol.* 27, No. 1





How They Did it in the '40s

In 1947, Thor Hyerdahl and five companions left Callio, Peru, on the Kon-Tiki raft and crossed 4300 miles in 101 days to Polynesia. Of the five, two were former Norwegian Resistance radio men, Knut Haugland and Torstein Raaby in charge of operating the short wave inches above water. Here's a very short exerpt of their story as written in Hyerdahl's book Kon Tiki

"Knut and Torstein were always doing something with their wet dry batteries, soldering irons, and circuits. All their wartime training was required to keep the little radio station going in spray and dew a foot above the surface of the water.

"The two radio operators had a tough job in their corner since the first day they came on board. The very first day, in the Humboldt Current, sea water trickled even from the battery cases so they had to cover the sensitive radio corner with canvas to save what could be saved in the high seas. And then they had the problem of fitting a long enough aerial on the little raft. they tried to send the aerial up with a kite, but in a gust of wind the kite simply plunged down into a wave crest and disappeared. Then they tried to send it up with a balloon, but the topical sun burned holes in the balloon so that it collapsed and sank into the sea. And then they had trouble with the parrot eating the wire. In addition to all this, we were a fort-night in a dead zone of the Andes in which the short wave was dumb and lifeless.
